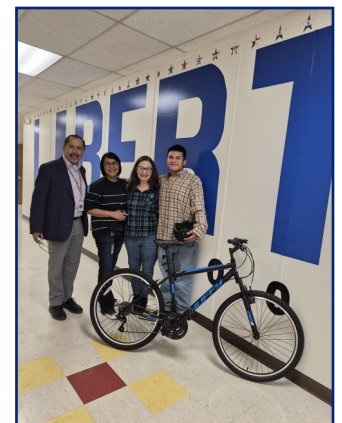

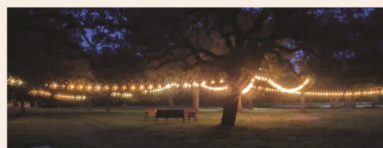
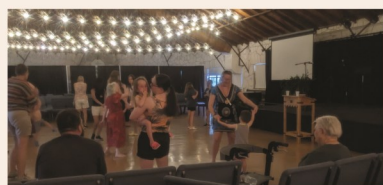

"The setting for the black and white portraits is the lobby area of a low-cost resort hotel on the beaches of Bulgaria. The time was late in the afternoon, the sun coming through large windows. We sat on plastic chairs. This was the last night of a week away from the war for families displaced by the war in Ukraine.

What interests me, is the expressions on their faces. They want to look good. They want to show beauty, strength, and courage. When I look in the eyes, however, I feel they have something to say that they have not yet put into words. This is what I would like viewers to think about.

Our work in Ukraine is with families displaced by the war. February 24, 2026 will mark the end of the 4th year of this war."

# MARCH MATTERS ST. PHILIP PRESBYTERIAN AND HOUSTON FAITH VOTES

Leading up to the primary elections on March 3<sup>rd</sup>, St. Philip's Peacemaking and Social Justice committee got the word out to congregation members encouraging them to get out, make a plan, vote, and bring a friend. 260 post-cards were given the personal touch during the Presbyterian Women's retreat with hand written messages. They were then stamped and mailed to all congregation members and friends. P&SJ had mail-in voters registration applications available for Harris and Fort Bend counties.



Voter's guides published by the League of Women Voters were also available in the Gathering Area. Key dates for the primary voting cycle were posted and updated weekly. Why are we doing this? Why are we making this

effort to keep the congregation informed? While the November general election often gets the most attention, the **primaries are where the real decisions are frequently made.**

Due to gerrymandering, 95% of the seats in the state legislature will effectively be decided during the party primaries.

As the Texas Tribune explains, only 18% of registered Texans voted in the 2022 primaries, and in the runoff, the turnout was as low as 6%. This means that **a tiny fraction of the state's voting-age population** disproportionately drives policy outcomes impacting nearly thirty million Texans.



Participating in the **March primary** and the **May runoff** ensures your voice is part of the influential group shaping our state's leadership.

Information will be forthcoming for the May runoffs and the general elections in November.

## LOVE BADE ME WELCOME: A LENTEN JOURNEY

Each year, the journey through the season of Lent is both searching and hopeful—leading us inward before we move onward. \*Love Bade Me Welcome\* by Ralph Vaughan Williams, with text by the 17th-century poet-priest George Herbert, offers one of the most vivid illustrations of the often complex array of emotions that this season brings. Herbert's text, aided by Vaughan Williams' music, narrates an interaction between a speaker and "Love," a representation of God, in which one guilty of sin finds acceptance and forgiveness.



Herbert's poem begins with hesitation: "Love bade me welcome: yet my soul drew back, / Guilty of dust and sin." It is difficult to imagine a more fitting Lenten confession—one that portrays our frailty and shortcomings with a quiet acknowledgment that we are "dust."

Marked by several changes in the music, the poem does not end in hesitation. Instead, Love—patient, tender, unhurried—draws nearer and asks "if I lacked anything." After a plea to Love to let "shame go where it doth deserve," Love replies, "You must sit down and taste my meat." The poem ends with a powerful acceptance: "So I did sit and eat." From beginning to end, Herbert's vision of God is neither accuser nor distant judge, but a welcoming host.

Vaughan Williams' music reflects these gentle dramatic gestures through subtle harmonic and textural shifts and an unhurried vocal line that unfolds with simplicity and warmth, never forcing emotion. The harmonies move with a calm assurance that mirrors Love's steady invitation to the end. There is no dramatic thunderclap of forgiveness—only a gradual dawning of redemption, which Vaughan Williams enhances by underscoring the vocal line with *O Sacrum Convivium*, a prayer that honors the Blessed Sacrament.

The journey from drawing back to sitting down at the table mirrors our own Lenten transformation. We begin in ashes, marked by repentance; yet as we move toward Holy Week and ultimately Easter, we discover that the Love who calls us to repentance is the same Love who prepares a feast. The self-examination of Lent is not meant to end in shame, but in communion. Even as we confess we are unworthy, Love replies with invitation.

Join us for an exploration and affirmation of Presbyterian beliefs as we study *Being Presbyterian in a Dysvangelical America*, a new book from Presbyterian ministers Ted Foote and Alex Thornburg. Copies of the book are available Sundays in the Gathering Area or during the week in the church office. Keatan King and John Wurster lead discussions of the book during the Sunday School hour in Room 202 and continuing through the Sundays in Lent.

**ADULT BIBLE STUDY**—Room 204—Join us from 9:30 to 10:40 a.m. as we seek to deepen our understanding of God's faithfulness to all God's people. In the fall, we began our study of Isaiah in Volume 2, *Prophets*, in Dr. Robert Alter's *The Hebrew Bible: A Translation with Commentary* (2019). All are welcome.

**CHURCH & SOCIETY**—Room 201—9:30-10:40 a.m.—**March 8 – The Darkness of God: Gregory of Nyssa and the Ethics of Apophatic Theology** presented by

Colby Selman - PhD Student in Early Christianity and Philosophy of Religion, Department of Religion, Rice University. In partnership with Rice University's "Humanities and Communities" Project, upper-level Ph.D. students in the School of Humanities are taking their research "beyond the hedges" in an effort to make their work available and accessible beyond the academic community. In the fourth century CE, Christianity transformed from a persecuted religious minority to the religion of the Caesars. The rapid political rise of Nicene Christianity brought a new set of theological and moral questions. What does it mean to be a Christian ruler? A Christian philosopher? A Christian slave master? To answer these questions, Cappadocian theologian Gregory of Nyssa (335-394 CE) turned to apophatic, or negative theology. Through his assertion of God's absolute ineffability, Gregory created a theological framework that imbricated the mystical and the ethical and ultimately led him to conclude that owning slaves was fundamentally sinful. In this presentation, we will explore how Gregory developed a theological framework based on his theology of Divine Darkness, and how this theology shaped his understanding of the human and the ethical obligations of the Christian. We will also briefly touch on Gregory's influence on Christian traditions that espouse negative theology today, specifically Eastern Orthodox Christianity. Colby Selman is a Ph.D. student in Early Christianity and Philosophy of Religion in Rice University's Department of Religion. Originally from Salt Lake City, Utah, Colby holds a B.A. in Linguistics from the University of Utah, and an M.A. in Religious Studies from Rice University. Colby's primary research interests focus on the intersection between slavery in Christian late antiquity, philosophical anthropology, and hagiography as a tool of ethical formation. He focuses specifically on the ways in which late ancient slave owning norms inflect early Christian hagiographical texts.

**March 15 – Observing Holocaust Remembrance Day** Sandy Breisacher Lessig is the daughter of a Survivor & has served as docent at Holocaust Museum Houston for 30 years. Now a vice chair of the Board of Trustees, she tells her family's story combining segments of her father's video testimony with narrative and helps other descendants of survivors develop their own presentations. She works closely with the Survivor/ Descendant community in Houston planning programs. She and Mickey Meyers were in the first class of docents and enjoyed a friendship since meeting over 30 years ago.

**March 22 - Dan Gordon on his new documentary on "The Peace Builders Project"** featuring Israeli and Palestine teenagers growing up with one another. The Peace Builders Project is a documentary filmed from 2022 to 2025, as we witness Palestinian and Israeli teenagers travel from the Middle East to a Texas-based peace building institute. Over the course of the film, these brave teenagers grow up, form bonds with each other, and strengthen their resolve for peace in the midst of the most devastating violence the region has experienced since 1948. The film captures their personal journey for peace in their homeland. Dan Gordon

is a documentary filmmaker and Executive Director of Gordon Education Initiatives for the Performing Arts, a nonprofit with a mission to empower youth voices through the art of digital media.

**March 29 – Being Presbyterian in a Dysvangelical America** presented by Rev. Ted Foote who will discuss the book, *Being Presbyterian in a Dysvangelical America: A Guide to Claiming the Good News of God*, which he co-wrote with Rev. Alex Thornburg. “Dysvangelical” is a term coined by Foote to describe a voice that’s articulated and has a lot of political power, used by people who are defining what they understand ‘Christian’ to be. “We wrote this book in many ways to push against that and what Presbyterians understand what it means to be faithful” and “not defined by this very loud public voice that’s got a lot of power these days.” Ted V. Foote Jr. serves as the Zbinden Chair Professor of Pastoral Ministry and Leadership at Austin Presbyterian Seminary. He has pastored Presbyterian churches in Texas and Oklahoma and authored several books, including *Being Presbyterian in the Bible Belt* (with co-author P. Alex Thornburg) and *Being Disciples of Jesus in a Dot.Com World*.
