The People gather on the Church Patio or the Chapel Garden.

Celebrant: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord!

People: **Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!**

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE PALM GOSPEL

MATTHEW 21:1-11

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

The Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

THE BLESSING OF THE PALMS

The People hold up their palm branches for the blessing

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: **And also with you.**

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: **It is right to give our thanks and praise.**

Celebrant: It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way.

The Liturgy of Palm Sunday

Today we begin the great journey with Jesus to his passion, death, and resurrection, and we hope that this commemoration of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem is a meaningful part of your observance of Holy Week and Easter.

The Liturgies of Holy Week are full of drama, movement, symbolic action, and remembrance. They all fit together into an entire liturgical experience, and they offer profound riches to those who give themselves to the entire cycle of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Eve, and Easter Day. It may seem like a lot of church for one week, but these services bring us to the heart of our Christian faith, and we shall never begin to understand that faith unless we are willing to walk with Jesus now. As you enter into the mystery of this week, let the actions, words, symbols, music and drama carry you along. Little by little, step by step, the truths that Holy Week reveals to us become a part of our living conversation with God.

Our Holy Week services first took shape in fourth-century Jerusalem after the time of Constantine, when it became possible for Christians to worship at the sites which have been traditionally associated with Jesus' last days, and these observances were taken by pilgrims back to their churches at home.

The Liturgy of Palm Sunday begins on a triumphant note, as we bless palms and remember the cheering crowds who welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem. But very quickly we are reminded, in the reading of the Passion Gospel, that this same crowd had turned against Jesus by the end of the week.

Celebrant: Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

People: Amen.

Celebrant: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

People: Hosanna in the highest.

THE PROCESSION

Celebrant: Let us go forth in peace.

People: In the name of Christ. Amen.

The people process into the church/chapel waving their palms in joy.

The Liturgy of the Word

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray:

Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Please be seated for the readings.

A READING FROM THE LETTER OF PAUL TO THE PHILIPPIANS

2:5-11

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW 27:11-54

*The customary responses before and after the Gospel
are omitted this day. Please be seated.*

Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus said, "You say so." But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?" But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed. Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?" For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him." Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barabbas." Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" All of them said, "Let him be crucified!" Then he asked, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified!" So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." Then the people as a whole answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him. As they went out, they

came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. **All stand.**

And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son.'" The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way. From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

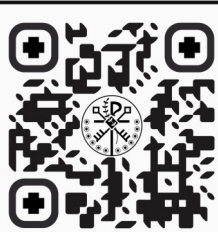

Easter Offering





Dear Friends in Christ,

You might not know this about me, but I was not raised in The Episcopal Church. I grew up in the modern Evangelical tradition, and Holy Week was never a part of our church calendar. In fact, the particular church I attended didn't even have a Good Friday service. We showed up on Easter Sunday and celebrated the holy mystery of the resurrection without any of the context for everything that led up to that moment.



Since I assume I am not the only person at All Saints' who had that experience, a group of about 35 of us read Borg and Crossan's book *The Last Week: What the Gospels Really Teach About Jesus's Final Days in Jerusalem* during Lent. They argue that the heart of Holy Week—including the way of the cross—is fundamentally tied to God's justice. On Palm Sunday, Jesus arrived in Jerusalem on a donkey where he was greeted by peasants. At about the same time, on the opposite side of the city, the Roman governor Pontius Pilate arrived on a war horse surrounded by legions of armored Roman soldiers. On Monday, Jesus discovered that the Temple merchants were exploiting the people who had traveled to Jerusalem to worship during Passover. In these and other scenes of Holy Week, the message is clear: God's Kingdom is not about might or wealth, instead, God's Kingdom is a kingdom of justice for all people.



This was not a new message; it is the work that God's people have been invited to do since the beginning. It is the tradition of the prophets who, generation after generation, called the people of Israel and all the nations to reconsider their actions and change their course. The prophet Micah gives us perhaps the clearest and most direct summary of this prophetic tradition:

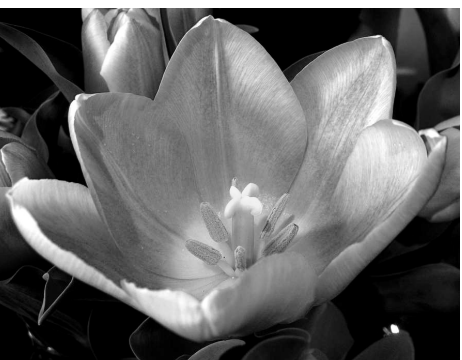


With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high?
He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you
but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

As we come to this annual reminder of our call to follow our Savior as we humbly pursue justice, love, mercy, and kindness, I cannot help but think of all the ways we are leaning into this ministry at All Saints'. At the beginning of Lent, our Quiet Day retreatants prepared 120 lunches for folks living on the streets while our Youth Group packed boxes at St. Mary's Food Bank. During Lent, we've been collecting hygiene supplies to help our friends at Nourish Phoenix serve the people in our community who are struggling to make ends meet. And earlier in March, we heard from our newest ministry partners, the Televerde Foundation, to discern what we can do to support women who are transitioning from incarceration to a new and hope-filled future.



As we journey through Holy Week this year, keep these (and other) things in mind. We are reaching toward the justice, love, and mercy that are at the center of the Holy Week story. If we allow them to, these stories that we've shared for 2,000 years will continue to shape us into the image of Christ. And this Holy Week, I would encourage you to consider the following:



1. **Pray** to for our community, our city, state, nation, and the world.
2. **Get involved** in one (or more!) of our ministries here at All Saints'.
3. **Give** to support the work we are called to do in the world as followers of Christ.
4. **Bring a friend** who is looking for peace and meaning in a world of frustration.

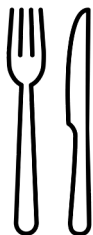
